STUDENTS GUIDE TO GCSE EXAMS

Updated November 2021

HEADTEACHER'S STATEMENT

Your GCSE exams are rapidly approaching. This booklet is designed to offer you help and advice in preparation for these exams. This booklet also states the rules and regulations of the exam boards that you must adhere to.

Please read through this booklet to ensure that you are familiar with what is expected of you.

RULES & REGULATIONS

YOU MUST:

- 1. Be on time for your exams
 - Morning exams begin at 9.15 am
 - Afternoon exams begin at 1.15 pm
 If you are late, your work might not be accepted by the exam boards.
- 2. Attend all exams in school uniform.
- 3. Clear the memory of any calculator that you use, before going into an exam.
- 4. Mobile phones and watches are prohibited in the examination rooms. Please DO NOT bring these items.
- 5. It is your responsibility to ensure that you bring ALL the correct equipment e.g. black pens, pencil, ruler, calculator etc.
- 7. Spectacle/Glass cases must be placed on the floor under your allotted desk but preferably left in your bag.

BE PREPARED FOR YOUR EXAMS



Equipment

- Remember to bring ALL the equipment you may need for your exams: a pen – black ink only and a <u>spare</u> one! calculator (where permitted) a pencil, ruler, eraser, compass, protractor etc.
- All this equipment must be stored in a clear plastic case.
- No other material must be taken into any of the examination rooms.
- Remember to go to the toilet **before** the exam starts as you will not be allowed to go during the exam (unless you have a toilet pass).
- Arrive at your assembly area 15 minutes before the start of the exam

Your final examination timetable will give you all the details you will need: dates, start and finish times etc.

Make sure you keep it somewhere safe!

DURING THE EXAMINATION

- Read the instructions on the front of the question and answer papers carefully so you understand what you need to do.
- Fill in any information on the front when advised to do so.

Tell the Invigilators immediately

- » If you think you have not been given the correct paper
- » If any of the materials (listed in a box on the front of the paper) are missing
- » If the paper is incomplete or badly printed

Work carefully and write clearly.

Don't rush. Pace yourself – if you have two hours to answer four questions, for example, make sure you spend half an hour on each. Exam questions are carefully designed and tested – they should take the estimated length of time to complete.

Show all your working/rough work. Cross it through when you have completed. Hand in all your of your work.

Leave yourself 5-10 minutes at the end to read through and check <u>all</u> your answers. You can often find mistakes/omissions and put them right.

During the exam, put your hand up if:

- » You need an additional answer booklet
- » You feel ill
- » You have a particular problem and need assistance. Invigilators cannot explain any of the questions as this is part of your exam.
- At the end of the exam stop writing when you are advised to do so.

Make sure your name and exam number are on <u>all</u> answer books you hand in. If you have used more than one fasten them together with a treasury tag which an invigilator provide.

 Exam conditions <u>DO NOT</u> end until you have left the room.

Don't be tempted to talk/turn around/ communicate in any way with other people. Your paper could still be cancelled!

 You must not leave the exam room until you are advised to do so.

Once you have been dismissed, collect your belongings and leave the room quickly and quietly as other exams may be continuing.

Please refrain from:

1. Become involved in any unfair or dishonest practice in any part of the exam.

Malpractice situations will be reported to the exam board. Depending on the severity it may mean being disqualified from <u>all</u> your exam subjects.

- 2. Talk to or disturb other candidates in any way once the exam has begun.
- 3. Take into the exam room any unauthorised equipment for example:
 - Wrist watches.
 - Mobile phones, MP3/4 Players, IPod's, Smartwatches or any other electronic devices with text/digital facilities.
 - Ordinary pencil cases, notes etc.
 - Calculator lids & instruction leaflets.
 - Bags, Coats etc
- 4. Impersonate another candidate.

This is a criminal offence and is dealt with by the police. You may be prosecuted in a court of law.

Candidates have been disqualified from their exams in previous years due to their behaviour and mobile phones going off.

WHAT TO DO IF YOU ARE ILL ON THE DAY OF AN EXAM



- If you are ill and are unable to attend an exam it is vital you phone the school first thing in the morning (01543 263446) to inform us.
- You must also obtain a letter or Form 10 (Self Certification Form) from your doctor detailing the reason for nonattendance. This should be given to the Examinations Officer within 3 days of the missed exam.
- If you are feeling unwell, but still able to travel, we suggest you attend the exam and we can assess the situation. In most cases it is better to take the exam if you can.
- If in doubt PHONE THE SCHOOL

If you do not attend an exam without a valid reason, it is possible that you will be charged for that exam.

EMERGENCY PROCEDURES FOR EXAMINATIONS

In the event of a fire alarm, the following procedures apply:

- Stop writing and remain silent.
- Listen carefully to the instructions given to you by the Examinations Officer/Invigilator
- All examination question/answer papers and materials should be left on the exam desk and NOT taken out. No bags or personal belongings including mobile phones and electronic devices should be taken out of the rooms.
- Remain calm and leave by the nearest fire exit. These are located at the rear of the sports hall. You should leave in single file, one row at a time starting at row one. You should stay at least one arm's length away from each another.
- You will be escorted to a safe area outside away from the main body of the school population, initially by the tennis courts.
- The invigilator will do a roll call to make sure everyone is accounted for.
- When the "all clear" has been given you will be escorted back to the sports hall in silence, where you will be re-seated.
- Once everyone has been accounted for the examination will be re-started with the appropriate time allowed.
- IMPORTANT You are still under examination board conditions and under NO CIRCUMSTANCES should you communicate with one another. Any breach of regulations could mean disqualification from the examination.

EXAM CHECK LIST



Aim to arrive at school 15 minutes prior to the start of an exam. Leave yourself plenty of time in case of problems with the journey.



When taking exams, bags, coats and mobile phones should be left outside the exam room. Because of this, it is recommended that you do not bring valuables with you to the exam.



Students must not have watches, mobiles phones or any electronic devices in their possession. The exam board will be notified and given the details of the malpractice. They will rule if you are to be disqualified from the paper or the entire subject award.



You should bring with you the correct equipment needed to do your exams as these will not be provided. Only clear pencil cases are allowed on your exam desk.



In an exam where you have the use of a calculator, you should not have a calculator cover/lid on your desk.

Sshh!

There is absolutely no talking or communication between students once you enter the exam rooms. If you have any questions, you should raise your hand once seated and an invigilator will come to you.



You should wear your full school uniform for all your exams.



No food is allowed in the exam hall. If you have a special requirement – please see Mrs Haddock in the Exams Office before the exams.



Water bottles are allowed in the exam hall. These should be clear bottles with a spill-proof cap. There should be no label on the bottle.

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

Q. What do I do if there is a clash on my timetable? It will be indicated on your timetable if there is a clash of exams. If you have any questions please consult the Exams Officer.

Q. What do I do if I think I have the wrong paper? Invigilators will ask you to check before the exams starts. If you think something is wrong put your hand up and tell an invigilator immediately as mistakes cannot be rectified after the exam.

Q. If I'm late can I still sit the exam?

Provided you are not more than 1 hour late, it <u>may</u> be possible for you to still sit the exam. You should get to school as quickly as possible and report to reception. A member of staff will escort you to the exam room. You <u>must not enter</u> the exam room without permission once an exam has started. It may not be possible to allow you extra time if you start the exam late. You should also be aware that if you start an exam 60 minutes after the published starting time, the school must inform the exam board and it is possible that they may not accept your work.

Q. If I miss the examination can I take it another day? No. Timetables are regulated by the exam boards and you must attend on the given dates and times.

AFTER THE EXAMS HAVE ENDED

How do I find out my results? (GCSE)

There are two ways of doing this:

- ❖ You (or your representative) may come into school Thursday 25th August 2022 to collect your results report. If someone is collecting on your behalf they must bring a letter signed by you giving them permission to obtain them and photo ID.
- ❖ If you cannot collect your results on the day, we will post out to you. <u>Please leave a stamped self-addressed</u> <u>envelope with the Exams Officer before you leave school</u> <u>after your last exam in June.</u>
