


STUDENTS

Which University – students and parents may have very different opinions on which universities students want to attend. There are many different factors that they need to consider, specifically the course on offer and the modules they complete, the facilities available, the accommodation, whether they prefer to be in the city or more rural, live away or live at home whilst studying.

Contextual offer universities – Some universities will lower the offers based on the school you go to and the area you live in as well as your personal circumstances, always worth checking when looking at entry requirements.


Russell Group Universities — universities within this group are research universities and are considered to be the top universities within their fields. Recently employers have said that students attending these universities will sit at the top of the pile for any job applications, however, this is solely dependent on the subject and career path you choose to take. Aspirations vs Realism – It is really important that students are aspirational with regards to the universities they apply to but also realistic. If they are currently achieving C grades then these will likely be the grades they are predicted for their applications and therefore will be rejected by most universities if asking for 3 A grades for example. Students have 5 choices, one choice should act as an **insurance choice** where the grades are lower. This essentially is a back up if students do not achieve the grades they needed but still want to go to university.




UCAS is the website to find and access any information regarding University courses,

UCAS process – Students will be given a buzzword which allows them to attach to the school profile so that we can support with their applications. They will use this to formulate their own log in during the summer term and begin to complete their application in sections. The deadline for applications is early **January 2024** for enrolment in September 2021. The deadline for any students applying for Oxford or Cambridge or Medicine, Dentistry or Veterinary Medicine is **October 16th**.

Employment (if relevant)
Choices (students get 5 choices unless studying medicine)
Personal statement

WHAT DO THE OFFERS MEAN?

Unconditional – this is where a University offers the students a place usually regardless of their grades (although always read the small print). Often associated with making them a first choice.

Conditional – students are given an offer subject to meeting their requirements. These are often lowered dependent on a number of factors.

Once students have received offers they will select a **FIRM** and **INSURANCE** choice. Students holding no offers can go through other processes.

Tuition Fee Loan

- Up to £9,250 (subject to inflationary increases)
- Fees will vary between course and universities
- Fees paid either by:
 - Tuition fee loan
 - Private Finance
 - Combination of the above
- Available to **all** applicants
- Non-means tested
- Full cost of fees available per year
 - Linked to course costs
- Paid directly to the University
- Repaid by student after graduation
 - Study now, pay later






Maintenance Loan

- To cover living and study costs
- Basic rate is non-means tested
- Remaining rate is **means tested**; what you get depends on:
 - Household income
 - Where you live
 - The year of course you're on
- Paid in 3 instalments direct to student





The Application Process







Repayments

- Starts the first April after graduating
- Loan repayments linked to your salary (9% of earnings over £25,000)
 - <£25,000 = no payments
 - £25,000 = £30.00 per month
 - £30,000 = £67.00 per month
 - £40,000 = £142.00 per month
- Interest is initially linked to RPI + up to 3%
- Does not appear on credit score
- Remaining debt wiped after 30 years





Scholarships & Bursaries

- Free pots of money
- Scholarships based on areas such as:
 - Academic performance
 - Specialist skill set
- Bursaries based on areas such as:
 - Household income
 - Family circumstances
 - Home Postcode
- Applied for via the institution awarding the money



What is the purpose of a personal statement?



- A personal statement shows admissions tutors your enthusiasm for a course and institution
- It demonstrates your achievements and wider experience that will be relevant to your studies/career
- It provides universities an insight into you and your interests
- Universities will use all of the above data to make a judgement as to your suitability to a course



How do you structure an effective personal statement?

- . What you want to study at University and why/or the job you have applied for
- Your interests and skills academic.
- · Experiences which show commitment and that you have developed a wide range of skills
- · Your interests and skills personal
- · Closing statement

Remember:

- 4000 characters or 47 lines of text.
- UCAS uses similarity detection software
- It needs to be personal to you and you need to be able to substantiate everything you write
- 75-80% academic and 20-25% personal



Advice and guidance

- Plan first!
- Get trusted people to read it e.g. parents/carers/ teachers
- Act on feedback that's given
- Start reading around or gaining experience in an area of interest
- Make sure everything you write in your personal statement is relevant -

You can use the ABC test to see if you are making it relevant:

- * A = Activity: This might be captaining a sports team, or being part of a drama club
- * B = Benefit: This is the skill(s) you have gained from doing the activity
- * C = Course: How the skill will help you to complete the course successfully



What does a good personal statement look like?

Less convincing examples:

'I have been fascinated by the idea of becoming a lawyer ever since I watched the TV drama Suits.'

Law

'My love for the subject began in Year 6, when I conducted independent research for a project on natural hazards, which introduced me to tectonic theory.'

Geography

More convincing example:

'Having read "End This Depression Now" by Paul Krugman I gained a deeper understanding of Keynesian theory. I found his argument convincing because...'

Philosophy, Politics and Economics

Read one of the example personal statements you have on your handout - take a minute to discuss the strengths and weaknesses.

OUR GUIDANCE

Opening paragraph – a 'catchy' opening about why you want to study that subject. If you are the first member of your family to study at university mention it here.

Paragraph 2 – the most relevant subject you study to that area. Skills you have learnt, specific subject knowledge, expertise and experiences.

Paragraph 3 - the academic and subject specific skills you have gained from your other subject areas.

Paragraph 4 – Experiences, skills and qualities gained from areas outside of your academic study within school.

Paragraph 5 – As above but outside of school.

Paragraph 6 – A short and punchy paragraph, no more than 2 or 3 sentences explaining why you are a good candidate for that course.

NB. This guidance is not prescriptive, every personal statement will be different but it does give a very good starting point.

JUNE – Academic References are written by subject teachers

^{5th} SEPTEMBER 2023 – First applications can be submitted

16th OCTOBER 2023 – Early entries; Oxbridge, Medicine, Dentistry and Veterinary Medicine

DECEMBER 2023 – School deadline

31st JANUARY 2024 – UCAS Final Deadline
